Network Updates

Dancing Otherwise Network: Exploring Pluriversal Practices

On the 6th November the Dancing Otherwise Network hosted 'Enacting the Dance Pluriverse: Strategies for organising otherwise'. A Keynote presentation by Suzanne Alleyne provided an opportunity to explore the neurology of power through Alleyne's work as a cultural strategist and consultant. Other speakers in the online event included curator Giulia Casalini, Liz King (Dance Identity Festival, Austria) and Karl Jay Lewin (Dance North, Scotland). These speakers contributed to a panel discussion that further explored the different organisational strategies that might be used to enact a dance pluriverse. The event brought speakers and audiences into dialogue to reflect on the different

structures of governance, understandings of power and models for resourcing that could contribute to a more inclusive dance industry.

Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network

On the 4th November the Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network launched its Early Career Mentorship Programme with a session by Professor Patricia Noxolo on 'Navigating Teaching, Mentorship, and Supervision in UK Higher Education as Black Faculty'.

The Early Career Mentoship Programme comprises four live sessions for Black academics in dance, performance, and tech, providing guidance on navigating academic systems and institutions. See below for details of forthcoming sessions.

Future Ecologies: Producing Dance Network (FE:PDN)

On 22nd October at the Beijing Dance Academy, Chris Bannerman presented the work of FE:PDN to the Beijing Performing Arts Association whose membership is drawn from producers and performing arts professionals in Beijing who are active across China. The FE:PDN focus attracted significant attention as there is growing interest in arts management in China but very little research into the role of producers.

On the 30th October the FE:PDN Early Career Group hosted an online event on the theme of producing dance and critical world building through a Butoh lens. As part of the event Elspeth Chan gave a presentation about her Butoh practice and her understanding of its potential to challenge onotological hierarchies and develop a decolonized embodiment as a means of critical world-building. The FE:PDN Early Career Group lead Dr 'Funmi Adewole facilitated a further discussion around the topic with group members.

The 11th November Arts Professional included the first of three articles designed to support the reach of the Sector Survey that FE:PDN will undertake in the coming months. It is also posted on the <u>FE:PDN website</u> and will be disseminated through other networks, hopefully including through our DRM contacts and colleagues!

Come and explore the 'Pluriverse' - an idea that describes a world of many worlds - through film and movement. How can we be one and many at the same time?

Unlike a universe, a pluriverse helps us to think about the ways in which different ideas about the world can exist at the same time. The term was most famously used by the Zapatistas – a group of people from Mexico who formed a 'landmark' liberation movement in the 1990's. Their ideas of equality, collaboration and working together have inspired people across the globe.

Perhaps some of these ideas and ways of working might inspire you to think and 'be otherwise' in your own life and

work. No previous dance or movement experience required.

This event is part of Being Human Festival, the UK's national festival of the humanities, taking place 7–16 November 2024. Being Human is led by the School of Advanced Study, University of London, with generous support from Research England, in partnership with the Arts and Humanities Research Council and the British Academy. The SADE Network has organised a webinar on 'South Asian Dance and Ableism'. Hosted by Balbir Singh Dance Company. Invited speakers include Ranjana Dave, Dr Shani Dhanda, Rey Dosaj, Maulikraj Shrimali and Dr Akhila Vimal C.

Ranjana Dave (she/her) is an independent artist and writer. Her practice, emerging from her movement training, and research and writing, unfolds at the intersection of text and movement. She likes to explore how people build relationships with other people, ideas, objects and ecologies - what makes us social beings. More at www.ranjanadave.com.

Dr Shani Dhanda sparks transformative change as a consultant, collaborating with businesses and brands to authentically embrace inclusion and accessibility. She is recognised as the UK's most influential disabled person and the BBC's 100 Women Laureate of 2020. Her expertise in disability inclusion has had a profound global impact, collectively reaching over 1.5 million employees worldwide.

Rey Dosaj has been in the arts for over 20 years and has worked for a wide range of organisations from large-scale venues to local mid-scale and small theatres. She was previously Head of Client Services at Inc Arts and prior to that worked as an Agent for Change with the Ramps on The Moon consortium which enabled theatres to break down barriers for people to access the arts safely.

Maulikraj Shrimali is a Dalit artist-activist and PhD student in Performance Studies at Northwestern University. He is founder of the anti-caste 'Whistle Blower Theater Group'. His research explores caste and race in/as performance, anti caste performance, social change, transformation, diaspora theater, and protest arts.

Dr Akhila Vimal C. is an independent scholar, dancer, and performance theorist whose research lies at the intersection of performance studies, ritual studies, ethnochoreology, dance pedagogy, and disability aesthetics. Her work critically examines India's intercultural performance traditions.

Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network

The Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network has produced an Early Career Mentorship Programme comprised of four live sessions for Black academics in dance, performance, and tech, providing guidance on navigating academic systems and institutions.

This is the second session in the Early Career Mentorship Programme. This session aims to support Black career academics to build a strong and competitive research profile within the UK academia. Professor Elswit will explore strategies for securing research funding, highlight the differences between grant writing and academic writing, and offer guidance on forming productive collaborations with colleagues and arts and cultural organisations. Additionally, participants will gain valuable tips on developing and leading a successful research team. There will be an opportunity to ask questions to Professor Elswit during the workshop.

Kate Elswit is Professor of Performance and Technology and Head of Digital Research at the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama. She is also Co-Director of the <u>Centre for Performance</u>, <u>Technology</u>, <u>and Equity (PTEQ)</u>, which was founded in 2024 with a £5.6 million grant from Research England. For the past decade, she has been collaborating with Harmony Bench to bring dance and experimental digital practice into conversation, including through the AHRCfunded projects <u>Visceral Histories</u>, <u>Visual Arquments: Dance-Based Approaches to Data</u> (2022-25) and <u>Dunham's</u> <u>Data: Katherine Dunham and Digital Methods for Dance Historical Inquiry</u> (2018-22), which won the ATHE-ASTR Award for Excellence in Digital Theatre and Performance Scholarship. As <u>Moving Data</u>, their dance data commission from the Whitney Museum of American Art appears in the <u>Edges of Ailey</u> exhibition (through February 2025).
