# Network Updates

## Dancing Otherwise Network: Exploring Pluriversal Practices

On the 12<sup>th</sup> February the Dancing Otherwise Network had its final event, 'Moving Otherwise: Making Change', at Kingston university. The event included contributions from Vicky Hunter, Michelle Elliott and Daniela Perazzo from the Dancing Otherwsie Network as well as Rosalind Holgate Smith, Manuela Albrecht, Stefan Jovanović and Seke Chimutengwende. #### Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network

From the 31<sup>st</sup> January – 2<sup>nd</sup> February the Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network held a three-day intensive residency in collaboration with Birmingham Open Media. The residency provided 10 funded places to UK-based Black dance artists to explore the use of digital and immersive technologies in their practices. During the residency, artists were given technical advice with workshops on Mocap, VR, AR, XR and sound technologies. In addition, the residency offered the artists the opportunitity to connect with others working in the field and learn more from established practitioners with experience working with digital and immersive technologies.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> February the Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network hosted its fourth session in the Early Career Mentorship Programme. This session was led by Professor Melissa Blanco Borelli and provided expert advice on how to navigate academic careers within and beyond the UK, with a particular focus on developing professional networks and fostering connections. # Opportunities

PhD studentship: Digital Black Practice at the Intersection of Racial Inequity and Ecological Justice

The Centre for Performance, Technology, and Equity (PTEQ) at the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama in collaboration with the Digital Black Dance Ecologies Network are accepting applications for a fully-funded PhD studentship.

Building from the AHRC-funded research network Digital Black Dance Ecologies, this fully-funded PhD project offers the opportunity to conduct original research at the intersections of digital Black performance practices, racial inequity, and ecological injustice. Proposals should articulate the potential for transformative insights into how digital technologies can challenge societal inequities and inspire meaningful engagement with urgent global issues, by exploring questions such as: How can specific technologies and techniques be employed to create immersive performance experiences with particular focus on issues of racial and ecological injustice? How might live data be utilised in performance to portray the ongoing impacts of climate-affected environments on Black communities for diverse audiences? In what ways can the development and design of immersive technologies for artistic purposes contest their colonial and extractive histories? We particularly welcome applications from artist-researchers who are already working in one or more of these areas, including through VR/AR/XR, real-time data in performance, and/or installation, and have a sense of the artistic, activist, and/or theoretical landscapes in which that practice takes place. This research may draw on critical frameworks including Digital Black Studies, African and Caribbean Diasporic Dance and/or Performance Studies, Environmental Humanities, and Decolonial Technological Praxis.
